

The Vicar Writes

So, what next?!

Last month's article about the proposed changes to the provision of clergy and the organisation of Parishes in the Diocese of Lincoln (and in the Church of England at large) provoked the largest number of responses I've ever had to one of my offerings for the Three Towers!

It certainly was encouraging. But, having glimpsed what the future holds and with many telling me that "Something *must* be done!", the obvious question is "*What* can be done?"

This, I fear, is where the excitement and concern will probably wane... Why? Because the answers aren't new, nor are they radically different from anything you may have heard in the past. The difference now is that a failure to act will result in an irredeemable loss. If we do nothing, our Churches will cease to offer regular worship and the buildings will suffer as they fall out of regular use. Their overall future will be in doubt and with it the availability of grave spaces, baptisms, weddings, funerals and the yearly liturgical highlights loved by many including, Christmas, Easter. Harvest and Remembrance Sunday (the Church's 'greatest hits'

as some refer to them).

More than that, pastoral links with the clergy will also be severed irreparably. People used to find security in the knowledge that a familiar face (or even someone they regarded as a friend) would be the one who presided over family weddings, baptisms and funerals. That will go. The Church will function more like a care agency; when you need a Priest they'll send someone but you won't know who and they probably won't send the same person twice. Above all, we stand to lose continuity of worship and care that has always been there and, seemingly, always would be.

The challenge is to safeguard that continuity by valuing it, owning it, maintaining it and investing in it before it fades away and dies.

Village communities are littered with houses known as 'The Old Bakery', 'The Old Post Office', 'The Old Forge'..... Their demise was a simple case of economics – people took the convenient option to shop elsewhere and those who ran them saw no future. But now we rejoice in new community / village shops popping up and pubs beginning to sell some of the everyday necessities. We've learned to value and reclaim some of what we'd lost but, even now, the

future for such initiatives isn't so secure.

The truth is that communities are more appealing to others when there are shops, amenities, schools, social groups, village halls and good transport links. Churches are part of that rich tapestry but they also offer more. The Church of England remains the spiritual guardian of the nation. We reach the places that others cannot! We cater for the deeper things in life; space where longings can be expressed, questions asked and hurts healed. We are concerned with the things of God! We have a message of hope for all and that hope radiates into the community through the people who try to live and embody it.

So, down to brass tacks... What *can* we do?

Well, the first challenge is for those who have faith, whether you be a regular, occasional or even annual attendee at Church. And the challenge? Be *more* faithful! It sounds blunt and almost unappreciative (for which I must apologise) but it remains crucial. The key element in all of this is to turn faith, even the smallest faith, into action and growth.

We need congregations that are

vibrant and viable! If you're holding back expressing your faith for a rainy day then, you risk the storm clouds overwhelming that noble intention. If you consider attending twice a month to be enough, then the reality is that you're relying on others to keep the show on the road in the meantime. If you consider twice a year to be enough then chances are there will still be something for you at Christmas and Easter but quality and continuity will undoubtedly suffer.

If services being offered on the internet has revealed something worrying it's that the quality of what passes for worship these days has dropped considerably. If you don't want to sing your carols to a CD and be left wondering why the worship seems as saccharine as Coca-Cola, then you'll need to invest your time and resources in maintaining the quality of what the Church does.

It's not just about having able Vicars. The clergy are being spread ever more thinly but with the support and direction of committed laity, we won't be consumed by mediocrity. Furthermore, the powers that be have decreed that variety in worship is now essential! What this unwittingly provides us with is the possibility of a return to well-known

Last year's annual Parish Meeting had to be deferred, because of the pandemic so this report covers the Parish Council's activities over the last two years.

Firstly my thanks to all Councillors for their support during the last twenty four months. The pandemic has presented challenges but the Clerk has been able to organise nearly all the usual meetings via Zoom. My special thanks go to Andrew Greenwood who after five years decided to step down but we welcome Paul Smith who joined the Council in May.

At the local elections Cllr Bob Adams and Penny Robins were elected to represent our community at County and Local level.

none were considered to be contentious. Applications for infill or back land development, remains an issue of concern for the Parish Council and will be closely monitored.

For the last four years the Parish Council has been lobbying for improvement works to the A6121, due to the regular accidents at the crossroads. Bob Adams (LCC) has been especially helpful and as a result vegetation was cut back to improve sightlines. The illuminating warning sign on the approach from Toft was recommissioned and new warning signage installed with an advisory 40mph speed limit. More recently double white lines have been laid on the approaches. It may be too early to draw conclusions but it does appear the accident rate has dropped. However, residents should still take extra care and warn any visitors that traffic coming from Toft is easily obscured by the left windscreen pillar.

Although the village has access to the defibrillator at the school, this is rather remote. So it was decided to purchase our own defibrillator and install it externally on the Village Hall, by the entrance door.

Concern was raised about the speed of traffic through the village, so the Parish Council has agreed to purchase a reactive speed sign which it is hoped can be installed this summer. The sign will record vehicle speeds and its location changed periodically.

The Parish Council continues to follow a policy of maintaining the annual precept on residents at the lowest level, but the foregoing items have been paid for out of reserves.

The village has benefited from SKDC's Big Clean initiative in particular the footpath down to the crossroads which was cleared of overgrowth. Cllr Benn's (SKDC) support was much appreciated in getting this work approved, as is the cooperation of local landowners in maintaining the footpaths.

A village WhatsApp group has been set up. We also have an up to date village map thanks to Lisa Lord, on the noticeboard outside the Village Hall. My thanks to Frances Plummer who has organised volunteers to paint the play equipment on the Green and Parishioners have come forward in a show of great community spirit, from clapping the NHS to the splendid efforts made to celebrate the 75th anniversary of VE day last year.

New Defibrillator

Although the school has always made it clear their defibrillator is available to residents in an emergency, it was felt that we needed something a little more visible and in a central location. So the Parish Council has purchased a new defibrillator which is mounted externally on the Village Hall next to the entrance door. Although it is in a secure cabinet, the ambulance service has the key code, which they will pass to anyone dialling 999 and nearby residents have also been given this information.

The defibrillator is designed so that anyone can use it, with simple voice instructions to talk you through the procedure. It is also designed so that you can grab it and run to the patient bearing in mind time saved at this point will be critical to the outcome. I would encourage anybody interested to watch the IPAD SP1 AED (defibrillator) training video on YouTube, but it really is simple to operate if you had to.

Let's hope we never have to use it but these devices do save lives.

LOCAL WALKS

Edenham – Swinstead – Creeton – Scottlethorpe – Edenham

Distance: 10 miles /16 km

Going: Easy going with stiles & gates - well-signposted and muddy in places after heavy rain.

Start: St Michael's and All Saints Church in Edenham


- Leave the church in the direction of Grimsthorpe. Go past the pub then turn left through a kissing gate into a field. Head across this and the next field through 2 more gates. On entering the 3rd field, keep to the hedge line exiting the field at a 3rd gate. Turn left then immediately right through a gate heading for the top right corner of this field.
- 2. Turn right through the gap, then left again towards a small bridge and a gate. Turning left after the bridge/gate, take the obvious path to the right following the ditch line towards the wood. The path bends left then right again following the wood boundary. Go straight ahead into the wood and follow this well-made path down to the Grimsthorpe lake. In addition to great views of the castle, there are also some benches on the lake-side.
- Follow the path around the lake over the bridge and past the shepherd's hut. Turn left here, following the yellow signed footpath.
 Walk up the hill turning left into the wood. Through the wood and on towards Swinstead Hall.
- 4. Turn left off the main track just after Park Farm through a small wooded area then across the field. At the end of the field, turn right onto the road past the Hall and right again at the bottom into the village. Turn left onto the High Street. Continue through the village and turn left at the end of the High Street following the footpath sign.

- 5. Turn right just after the telegraph pole following the track as it bends left. Keep the hedge on your left and walk towards the wood ahead. Be careful you do not miss the left turn over a stile 50 m before the wood. Over the stile and head diagonally downhill. Turn left at the bottom of the hill and head for the wooden bridge. Straight ahead over a stile (or through the gate, if open) and up Gorse Hill. Follow the path past the wood until you meet a wide track. Turn left and follow the track all the way into Creeton.
- 6. Turn left into Creeton, over the bridge then right towards the church. As the road bends right go left following the footpath over a stile then turning right onto the footpath up the hill. Follow the hedge line towards the next wooded area.
- 7. Keeping the wood on your right, go through a gate heading along the path under the mistletoe laden trees. Go through the next gate and then a stile and across metalled-surfaced Chestnut Avenue where you have a decent view of Grimsthorpe once more on your left. Carry on along this route and over the stile at Pebble gate (an impressive high old wooden gate). Follow the path around the wood to the right. Half way along here the route bears left across a field towards a gap in the hedge.
- 8. Through the gap turning left onto a well-maintained concrete road. Follow this concrete road past the wood and straight ahead onto the tarmac road leading to Scottlethorpe. Go through Scottlethorpe, eventually reaching the A151 once more. Turn left and back towards the church.

What is Bourne Foodbank?

A foodbank is a centre for giving emergency food to those in crisis in our community. Today there are people struggling to put food on the table. Bourne foodbank provides emergency food and support to local people in crisis.

The Bourne foodbank is part of a network founded by the Trussell Trust, a Christian Trust committed to self-sustaining community projects which tackle poverty and social exclusion in the UK and is locally operated by the 'Churches Together in Bourne'. Our foodbank is organised and run entirely by volunteers. We open Tuesdays 1pm to 3pm and Fridays 9am to 11am.

During the pandemic, we have had to change the way we operate at the foodbank. Pre-pandemic clients would be offered refreshments and the chance to sit and talk to one of our volunteers. During this time there was an opportunity to signpost clients to any support agencies which may help them overcome, or deal with, the situations they found themselves in. Sadly, this all stopped in March 2020. We now only have 4 volunteers working at each session (instead of 6). This was initially due to some volunteers shielding, as well as minimising the number of people working in our small confined stockroom. At the moment, only 2 clients are allowed into our premises at a time. Signposting has stopped and face masks are worn at all times. Food parcels are prepared in advance, so we can get clients in and out quickly. While people were shielding, we started delivering food to those who were unable to reach us. We still have three delivery drivers available for each of our opening times. Although we have been extremely busy during the past 16 months, we have been absolutely overwhelmed by the generosity of local people, schools, churches, businesses and organisations. Our clients had extra treats at Christmas and Easter - thanks to the thoughtfulness of others. We are also able to provide small gifts, if we find out that clients, or someone in their family, has a birthday coming up. At times, we have also issued vouchers to enable clients to purchase their own fresh fruit, veg and meat.

I have been involved with the foodbank in Bourne for 3 years. Since the start of the pandemic, I have run the Tuesday sessions along with other

hardworking volunteers who work on a rota system. We've had to adapt and change, sometimes at short notice. At times it has been hectic! Weighing in, sorting and dating large deliveries of donations, greeting and thanking individuals who arrive with donations, preparing and ensuring our delivery drivers know where they are going, as well as ensuring clients are welcomed and receive the food they are entitled to. (Another team of volunteers do exactly the same on Friday mornings.) Despite the hectic times, I thoroughly enjoy what I do. I've learnt so much and met some wonderful, caring people.

Sadly, there is a need for a foodbank in Bourne. Thankfully, there are some extremely generous people living in Bourne and the surrounding villages. It's because of this generosity that we are able to support those in need in our community. Hopefully, in the very near future, we will be able to operate our foodbank more normally - once again offering refreshments and a friendly ear to listen to our clients and then point them in the right direction to access the help and support they may need.

106 years ago this month

(From entries made by the Rev L H Cooley into the Parish Magazine—reproduced by kind permission of The Witham on the Hill Historical Society)

July 1915

Collections for the Stamford Infirmary. - The house-to-house collections were very kindly made by Mrs Hill in Witham and Manthorpe and by Miss Lee in Toft and Lound. The amounts are: Witham £3/4/0, Manthorpe 11/4, Toft-cum-Lound 15/9. Total for the parish £4/11/7, which is an increase of 30/- upon last year's amount.

We beg to thank the subscribers most heartily for their increased support of this deserving cause, especially this year when the calls upon us all are so numerous.



Stamford Red Cross Motor Ambulance. - A house-house collection in aid of the above has been made in Witham, and the handsome sum of £8/16/4 has been realized, and has been sent by Mrs. Fenwick to the Mayoress of Stamford.

The Lincolnshire Hut at Netley. - This hospital is entirely supported by the monthly contributions from Lincolnshire villages. We collect here about 14/- per month. A few additional monthly subscribers of 6d. or 1/- would be most welcome. Lady Ancaster *(Grimsthorpe)* appeals also this month for towels and socks as the articles most required at present at the Front.

Overseas Club Penny Fund. - A sum of 19/- has recently been collected and given by the schoolchildren towards this fund, which despatches gifts and comforts for the troops abroad. Postcards are enclosed in the parcels, to enable recipients to send their thanks to the donors.

(British schoolchildren contributed to the war effort in ways other than designing and painting fund raising postcards. For example, a few weeks before Christmas 1915, the '**Over-seas Club**' launched an appeal aimed at the children of Britain. It invited each of them to take at least one penny to school, where their teachers would set up collection points. The money collected would go to providing parcels of tobacco and cigarettes and other comforts, **"so that everyone of our brave soldiers and sailors will be happy on Christmas day."** said a publicity leaflet. The appeal was a great success and each child was given a colourful certificate bearing his/her name – to show that they had contributed to the 'Penny Fund'.)

Jane's seasonal recipe

Thanks to Sue Cork for this very tasty veg accompaniment to a meat dish, or as a vegetarian dish on its own.

Courgette, Potato & Feta Bake

1 large courgette 4/5 large potatoes 200g feta cheese Olive oil Dried mint

Pour about 2 tablespoons of oil in a large shallow dish. Peel & thinly slice the potatoes, slice the courgette about ¼ inch thick. Put a layer of potatoes in the dish, then half the courgettes, crumble half of the feta over the top & sprinkle liberally with dried mint. Repeat the layers again, & finish with another layer of potatoes. Pour over more olive oil & bake at 200c for approx 1½ hours until the potatoes are cooked through.
