

The Vicar Writes

As this is my first proper missive of the new year, I thought I might take the opportunity to mention something I've been thinking about for a while and to answer a question that's been put to me several times in the last year or so...

A chance to renew your wedding yows in 2022!

Every now and then you hear about people renewing their wedding vows. I once suggested it to my wife who quickly responded "Why? What's wrong with them as they are?" She did have a point! The truth is that no one needs to renew their wedding vows (they remain in place until death-do-us-part), but people do like to recall, remember and celebrate their vows and the Church is all too happy to help. Most often, when people ask about a renewal service, questions then follow about who to invite and whether to have a party afterwards. This is where many a good intention falters due to the potential cost and the inevitable difficulty involved in getting everyone together all at once. So, with that in mind, we've decided to hold a service at St Michael and All Angels in Edenham this summer to allow husband-and-wife couples to renew

their wedding vows en masse (so-to-speak).

JUST TO BE CLEAR... It doesn't matter which village you live in, how long you've been married, whether you were married in Church or if you've been married before. We would simply like to offer this opportunity for husband-and-wife couples to gather with family, friends, neighbours and anyone else who wants to come along, to celebrate their relationship and to renew their marriage vows in one big service lasting around forty-five minutes followed by (we hope) a glass of bubbly and the opportunity to take a few pictures (weather permitting).

If your wedding dress still fits then feel free to wear it, dress up if you want to or simply come as you are (children are, of course, very welcome too). There won't be a charge, we'll simply pass the plate round for donations to help cover costs. That's it! Simple (we hope). Why don't you do private baptisms (Christenings)?

Once upon a time I was in the papers and on the TV for doing a fire-eating routine at Baptisms (see https:// www.youtube.com/watch? v=vaFdbpnpZ U). My moment in the spotlight included being called in for a nerve-racking interview on 5Live Drive with Peter Allen whilst on holiday in Newcastle. This all took place during my time in Grimsby where a relatively new housing estate guaranteed a constant flow of baptisms (sometimes up to four a week). The Church where I served could only seat around a hundred people so we would baptize two children every Sunday during a standalone service at 11.30am and limit the guests to fifty for each family.

As people were making their way from the Church after the main Sunday service, a stream of other folks would pass them by on their way to the baptism. The two groups never actually met which didn't really make much sense.

When someone is baptized, they become a member of the Church and part of the family of God. Ideally, those who are already a part of that Church family should be there to join

in the celebration and to welcome their newest member (several parts of the service reflect this dynamic). If the people of God are absent, then it's a bit like being selected to play for a new football team only to discover that the fans, manager and other ten players are missing on match day.

The people of God need to be present and to offer a warm welcome to the family and friends of those who are being baptized and to guide them through the service. That is why baptisms in the Benefice usually take place within the Sunday Parish Eucharist. This has been the policy in the Parishes for many years and though it might not be what people always want, we can at least say with honesty that this is 'who we are' as your local congregation and that we are the folk who want to welcome you and encourage you in following Christ. The Stamford Eleanor Cross

It was a well-known medieval love affair. In 1254, Prince Edward of England at age 15 married Eleanor of Castile aged 9 years. They were devoted to each other and had sixteen children. When Eleanor died in 1290, Edward, now King Edward I, was devastated with grief.

Eleanor died at Harby in Nottinghamshire, just west of Lincoln. Edward ordered that her body was ceremonially carried from Lincoln to Westminster for burial and a memorial cross erected at every one of the twelve resting places on the way. Stamford was one of them. These are the famous Eleanor Crosses.


The crosses are in general polygonal in plan, about 40 feet high and decorated like gothic cathedrals with niches, coats of arms, statues, pinnacles, and topped with a cross. Perhaps the best remaining crosses are at Geddington near Kettering (pictured opposite), and Hardingstone in Northampton which was recently subject to a £95,000 restoration.

The Stamford cross disappeared between 1642 and 1660. Its destruction has been blamed on Parliamentarian soldiers stationed in Stamford during the English Civil War, who objected to anything remotely Roman Catholic or "Popish". The town lay between Royalist and Parliamentarian heartlands and suffered many raids from Royalist bases in Newark, Belvoir, Rockingham and Rutland.



The location of the Stamford cross has caused much debate. One argument states that the site appears to be somewhere on the Casterton Road, once the Great North Road, between Scotgate and the top of the hill going to Casterton. Another view says the cross was located at the junction of Casterton Road and Empingham Road.

In 1745 William Stukeley, an antiquarian, reported that a turnpike road surveyor opened a tumulus half a mile north of Stamford on the brow of a hill by the roadside. The surveyor discovered the foundation of the cross



with the lowermost tier of steps complete and part of the second, made of Barnack Stone, hexagonal in shape with sides 13 ft long. He further reported that the noble monument was pulled down 100 years earlier by the "reforming rabble". Stukeley did some further excavations, taking away some items for his collection. A carved rose of Purbeck marble, found its way into Stamford Museum and, following its closure, into Stamford Library.

Stamford now has a new Eleanor Cross, situated in Sheep Market (pictured left). It was created as the centrepiece of the £1.3 million Stamford Gateway project carried out in the early 2000s which refurbished and pedestrianised Sheep Market and Red Lion

Square. The areas were previously used for car parking. The narrow streets and lanes between the historic stone buildings of the town are one of its attractions but they don't leave a lot of room for car parking.

Commissioning and overseeing the work was Stamford Vision established in 2000 to promote the future of Stamford. It is a partnership of local government, business, the voluntary and educational sectors and community groups.

With Stamford often described as England's finest stone town, there was not much doubt that the new artwork should be in stone and the preference was for a local stone, which was why Ketton and Clipsham were used, supplied respectively by Castle Cement and Clipsham Quarry Company.

Stamford Vision ran a competition for the new artwork in the Gateway project and selected a design by sculptor Wolfgang Buttress from nearly 40 entries. Wolfgang is an award-winning English artist based in Nottingham whose work is exhibited around the world. His plan was to use Ketton

limestone and bronze for the cross, surrounded by benches in Clipsham stone.

It was the rose in Stamford Museum (pictured opposite) that inspired Wolfgang in his "reinterpretation" of the monument. Essentially, it is a round tapering pillar 4 ft diameter at the base, with stone rising to a height of 13 ft. On top of that are 23 ft of bronze. Carved roses gradually evolve from the hewn stone at the base of the monument, with this motif continuing into the



bronze, with the surface then becoming plain until the needle point at the top. Wolfgang Buttress says the scale of his reinterpretation of the cross was dictated by the surrounding buildings. He wanted it to be prominent but not overwhelming. The stone benches forming a broken circle around the base focus attention upon the cross. York stone paving connects the Sheep Market and the cross to Red Lion Square where more benches and a milestone, the lower part of which has been distressed, as if weathered by the years, have been placed.

At the opening ceremony in July 2008 South Kesteven District Council made the comment that the investment in Sheep Market and Red Lion Square has enlarged the pedestrian areas, giving residents, visitors and tourists better access to the shops and facilities available. The choice of stone for the paving, seats and sculptures complements and adds to the historic character of the centre, and will look even better in 5, 10 or even 50 years' time.

In my opinion, most artworks provoke controversy, and the new Eleanor Cross is no exception. Perhaps this is what the sculptor intended. I myself love any sort of public art; I think there should be more of it. But the new Cross does not look remotely like the original crosses. A visit to Geddington or Hardingstone will show the cross in all its medieval glory.

So, again in my opinion, public art in Stamford is wonderful but an Eleanor Cross it isn't.

Steam Action began back in 1972 when a group of Edenham teenagers decided to provide entertainment and dances at the Village Hall. In that first year, every elderly resident was given a present to the value of £1.

By 1974, we were handing out birthday cards, organising quizzes, dances and coffee mornings, even arranging coach trips to stately homes and theatres. On the last Sunday in November, logs were delivered to each household, along with an invitation to the Christmas party with lunch and a show! A tradition that continues today, only instead of 35 people, we now cater for over 90 folk. Our pantomime has become so well known that we hold a further two performances for the public!

Public Open Forum - As there were no members of the public on the zoom meeting the Chairman closed the open forum.

Commencement of the Parish Council Meeting

Approval of Minutes - The minutes were accepted as a true record of the meeting held 9th November 2021.

Parish Clerk and Councillors update from previous meeting

Community Street cleaning - Fly tipping is an ongoing problem within the Parishes we are continuing to report this to SKDC.

Gigabyte Voucher Scheme -

Councillor Clarke confirmed that the cost of approx. £47k remains and whilst there is some funding available the full costs cannot be achieved.

Openreach/BT Exchange Building Grimsthorpe - Works to reduce the height of the conifer trees is still outstanding, the Parish Council are continuing to push for BT/Openreach to complete this work.

Mobile Post Office - The Parish Council are awaiting confirmation of when this service will be reinstated.

Coal Yard Frontage, Main Street Edenham - This area is looking much better following work completed by Grimsthorpe Estates, the stone

trough flowerbed is in position and this has helped to reduce vehicle parking.

Parish Council Laptop - The Parish Council agreed the purchase of a new laptop.

Scottlethorpe Road Resurfacing - Whilst the works on the road were welcomed there was considerable disruption and it was disappointing that the Parish Council, residents and businesses affected had not received written confirmation in advance of the planned works. In February 2021, the county council's road maintenance grant was reduced

from £51m down to £38.7m – a 25% cut around £12.5m /year. As a result, county councillors voted to fill this funding gap by allocating £12.3m from council reserves for this financial year. There is an urgent need for government to reinstate their highway maintenance funding to previous levels where it correctly recognised the importance of good roads for safety and economic confidence. We are lobbying Government to reinstate its Highways Maintenance Grant for Lincolnshire to the 2019/20 levels.

February 1915

Jane's Seasonal Recipe

I found this recipe in a craft magazine as a suggestion for home-made edible Christmas gifts, and couldn't resist giving them a try. Very moreish!

Sour cherry and White Chocolate Garibaldi

125g butter
275g sr flour
75g caster sugar
4 tablespoons milk
175g dried sour cherries (or dried cranberries)
1 egg
200g white choc

Rub butter into flour until it looks like breadcrumbs. Stir in sugar and milk, bringing together to form a dough. Briefly knead until dough is smooth. Wrap in cling film and chill for 15 mins to firm up. Roll out dough to make 2 rectangles, approx. 24x30cm each. Sprinkle cherries over one rectangle, then lay other rectangle on top. Re-roll to press the cherries down. Trim edges to neaten, then cut lengthways into thirds; then cut each strip into 8 pieces. You should have 24 equal rectangles. Transfer to paper lined baking sheets, brush with beaten egg, and sprinkle with a little caster sugar. Bake 15 mins at 180c until lightly golden. Leave to cool on baking sheets. When biscuits are cold, melt white choc and half dip each biscuits lengthways in the choc. Return biscuits to baking sheets to set.
