### **The Vicar Writes**

I must admit that I'm not normally one for poetry, but I recently chanced upon a poem called 'Floral Tribute' by the poet laureate Simon Armitage, composed in the wake of the Queen's passing. According to the BBC website, 'Floral Tribute' was written through the metaphor of the lily of the valley – one of the late Queen's favourite flowers and one which featured in her coronation bouquet.

However, it wasn't the many floral references that caught my eye, nor the fact that the first letter of each line, when taken together, spells out the name Elizabeth. No, it was the mention of a promise and a gift that stood out for me. The author wrote, "A promise made and kept for life that was your gift - Because of which, here is a gift in return."

The promise made refers to the speech given by the then Princess Elizabeth in 1947 on her twenty-first birthday whilst on a tour of South Africa with her parents and younger sister Margaret. In that speech, broadcast on the radio from Cape Town, the Princess dedicated her life to the service of the Commonwealth stating, "I declare before you all that my whole life whether it be long or short shall be devoted to your service and the service of our great imperial family to which we all belong."

When we gathered in June to give thanks and to celebrate her majesty's life at the time of her Platinum Jubilee, that declaration, that promise, was still a work in progress. But, following the sad news of her death, it reached its fulfilment – it became a promise made and kept for life. That promise, made and kept, was undoubtedly Her Majesty's gift to us and to so many people around the world.

But what of the gift in return mentioned in the poem? What could anyone possible give to the Queen in return for her extraordinary life of duty and service? What could be of equal value, merit or worth? Well, I'm sure the poet laureate has his own ideas about that but, then again, so do I! You see, there is a gift that I have often heard the Queen speak of; one that she declared to be her inspiration, her encouragement and the very bedrock of her life. That gift is also a promise for life but it promises 'life' of a rather different sort. If you hadn't guessed already, I'm referring to the gift and promise of eternal life made to us by God

through the life, death and resurrection of his Son our saviour Jesus Christ.

In her 2021 Christmas speech, the Queen referred to Christ as being "a man whose teachings... have been the bedrock of my faith." Back in 2011 she declared "Although we are capable of great acts of kindness, history teaches us that we sometimes need saving from ourselves - from our recklessness or our greed. God sent into the world a unique person neither a philosopher nor a general (important though they are) - but a Saviour, with the power to forgive." Her Majesty recognised that, regardless of our capacity for good, we are a fallen people in need of saving and that God in his love and mercy has sent us the gift of a Saviour.

One thing that we might not be aware of is that all of us have repeatedly asked God to grant that gift of eternal life in Christ to our late monarch. That is exactly what we have articulated whenever we sang or said, "God save the Queen". At the heart of the National Anthem is the prayer that God in his mercy would save the Queen and grant her the gift of everlasting life. The Queen has kept her promise and God will keep his too. Eternal life in Christ is his 'gift in return' to her and the same gift is offered freely to all who come to him in penitence and faith as she did.

So, as we give thanks for the life of our Queen, acknowledging her promise fulfilled, let us also rejoice that the Saviour she sought to exemplify in word and deed will now bestow upon her his gift in return. God has heard our prayer, he has saved our gracious Queen.

#### LINCOLNSHIRE CHURCHES TRUST RIDE AND STRIDE 10 SEPTEMBER 2022

#### **Reports from Frances Plummer and Jane Clark**

#### Frances:

Peter and I chose to take the same route as last year in the Lafford deanery, starting at Oasby (no church there but coffee with friends who then joined us for part of the cycle). After the disappointment of last year when we only found 3 churches open, we were interested to see if the situation had changed. We did not get off to a good start with our first church (St Michael and All Angels at Heydour) locked. We went on to the church of St Thomas at Aunsby which was open and chocolate bars and orange juice awaited us, swiftly followed by St Lucia, Dembleby, disappointingly locked. From then on the situation improved with a cycle down the byway to St Andrew's at Scott Willoughby – the smallest church still in use in the county. It is a delight: tiny and set in farmland. From there we returned to Dembleby via the byway and crossed the A52 to climb the hill to St Botolph's in Newton. This was the highlight of our ride as, not only was the church open, but manned by several local residents and the Church Warden. They were serving coffee and homemade scones! We took time out to chat before going for a sandwich and drink at The Red Lion. Peter and I then went on to St Nicholas in Walcot, St Andrew's in Pickworth and St Nicholas' Sapperton (all open and offering refreshments, though unmanned) before getting caught in a rainstorm enroute to St Margaret's, Braceby (open with refreshments) and finally St Barbara's Haceby, a redundant church rather hidden in trees and farmland! Thank you very much to all who sponsored me: it was a very enjoyable and worthwhile day and lovely to find so many of these small, beautiful churches with open doors.

It was also very moving to find several of these churches set up in honour of our late Queen with beautiful pictures of her and books of Condolence and flowers.

#### Jane:

Bob and I set off on an overcast Saturday morning. We decided to head north west on the hilly route where our first call was St Medard's Church, Little Bytham and our first biscuits of the day. Onwards to St Peter's at Creeton, where we enjoyed delicious shortbread biscuits, then to St Mary's, Swinstead. The weather improved and we even enjoyed some sunshine. It was good to see fields harvested and ploughed, and the hedgerows heavily laden with hawthorn berries and blackberries. At St John's, Corby Glen, there was a lot of activity, preparing for a baptism to take place very shortly, but a Church Warden made time to explain the medieval wall paintings to us. We went to The March Hare in the village square and enjoyed an excellent late breakfast/lunch, which fuelled us on for the next part of our ride. This was probably the quietest section, to St Andrew's, Irnham, where we admired the copy of the Luttrell Psalter. We cycled through Bulby and on to Edenham, heading straight for the Village Hall, where the Steam Action Produce Show was in full swing! We admired all the magnificent flowers, vegetables, preserves, and crafts; then couldn't resist a cuppa and a piece of delicious mango and coconut cake! We were delayed by a short shower, but once it had eased, we cycled to Edenham Church and enjoyed yet another biscuit! Somehow the chain came off my bike just outside Edenham Church but my mechanic, Bob, soon sorted it out! We headed for Lound in light drizzle but it soon eased off and we had to remove our waterproofs, as it was getting too warm! We arrived home, saddle sore, just before 5pm after a very enjoyable day cycling – though parts of it were a bit steep and we had to get off to walk up some of the hills. It was great to find all the Churches open for prayer and contemplation, with tables set up with photos and books of condolence due to the recent passing of Her Majesty the Queen. We were surprised and disappointed not to see any other cyclists on our route but hopefully they were all cycling out on the flat fens! Thank you to all our generous sponsors – once collected, we will have raised £250, half of which goes to St Andrew's Church, Witham on the Hill, and the other half to the Lincolnshire Churches Trust.

- Select Lock Screen
- Select Notifications
- Select Don't Show Notifications. Your messages will no longer flash up when your phone is locked

### The Monarchy of Great Britain

The tragic death of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II on Thursday 8<sup>th</sup> September sparked off a wave of grief throughout this country and the world. However, expressions of praise for her long reign, her dignity, warmth and humour have been equally widespread, as have good wishes for her successor, King Charles III.

The monarchy of Britain is one of the longest lasting such institutions in the world. Usually, it is reckoned to start with William the Conqueror in 1066 but arguably it went back a lot further. Following the departure of the Romans in about 410 AD, Britain was invaded by Angles, Saxons, Jutes and other tribes from the continent. Seven Anglo-Saxon kingdoms emerged. In the 9<sup>th</sup> century Wessex achieved supremacy over the other kingdoms and Egbert who ruled Wessex from 802 to 839 was named "Bretwalda" or "King of the British". There was an interregnum between 1649 and 1660 when, following the civil war and the execution of King Charles I, Britain became a military dictatorship under Lord Protector Oliver Cromwell. After Cromwell's death, King Charles II was restored to the throne.

Elizabeth II reigned for seventy years and seven months, the longest reign of any monarch in this country and the longest reign of any female head of state in the world. On 9<sup>th</sup> September 2015, she exceeded the tenure of Queen Victoria who was on the throne for over 63 years. Victoria reigned for longer than Henry III at 56 years and George III at over 59 years.

Out of 43 monarchs since the Norman Conquest, Elizabeth II was only the fifth lady to accede to the throne in her own right, the others being Mary I, Elizabeth I, Anne and Victoria. These ladies are known as Queens Regnant. Arguably two more could be included: Queen Mary II and her husband King William III who ruled jointly from 1689, and possibly Lady Jane Grey who, as a Protestant, was proclaimed Queen after the death of her cousin Edward VI, son of Henry VIII. Jane was ousted by Mary I after a popular uprising and never crowned.

Other queens of England held the title because they were married to a king. They are known as Queens Consort. But the reverse is not true. The husband of a queen does not hold the title of king, except Mary I's husband, Philip of Spain, who was declared king by right of his wife and given powers equal to her while she reigned. Queen Anne's husband, Prince George of Denmark, received no British titles other than the Duke of Cumberland, his princely title being Danish. Elizabeth I never married. Victoria chose the title Prince Consort for her husband Albert in 1857. However, the Duke of Edinburgh did not hold this title as he chose to reject it in the early years of the Queen's reign. He was created Prince Philip in 1957.

Camilla Duchess of Cornwall, wife of King Charles III, was going to be called Princess Consort on his accession. The reason given was that she divorced her first husband. She rejected the title Princess of Wales out of respect for Diana, Charles's first wife, who held the title until her death on 31<sup>st</sup> August 1997. But in her message published to mark the 70th anniversary of her reign, Elizabeth II stated that it was her "sincere wish" for Camilla to be known as queen consort upon Charles's accession to the throne. Which she did.

Ignoring republicans and some left-wingers who feel the monarch of the United Kingdom should be replaced by an elected head of state, Elizabeth II was held in tremendous love and respect by all her subjects. So much so that many structures have been named after her. Most recently the Elizabeth Line, the new London Underground network first known as Crossrail, the Queen Elizabeth Olympic Park in East London, venue of the 2012 games and the Elizabeth Tower, at Westminster Palace, the home of Big Ben. In addition, numerous bridges, hospitals, schools, streets and a large slice of the Antarctic continent, to name just a few. Her portrait has been painted many times. Most very good, some terrible. My personal favourite is by Pietro Annigoni whose 1955 painting with the Queen wearing the robes of the Order of the Garter was commissioned by the Worshipful Company of Fishmongers of the City of London. A reproduction hangs on the walls of many public buildings, town halls and schools and is here pictured.

Proclamations for the reign of Charles III have been ringing out across the country and the world. His mother has left him a hard act



to follow. He has suffered the glare of publicity throughout his life, much of it non-complimentary, and his life and lifestyle have attracted much criticism, mostly unjustified. Yet he has risen above all this and retained his sense of humour and dignity and has already shown the authority of a King. Charles plans to become a more approachable and open monarch, less distant from his subjects than some of his predecessors. For instance, on arrival at Buckingham Palace on Friday 9<sup>th</sup> September he met the waiting crowd accepting handshakes from all and even kisses from women in the crowd. He wants to slim down the Royal Family, perhaps dispose of some of their palaces and is keen to preserve the United Kingdom and the Commonwealth. In my personal view Charles will make an excellent King and the monarchy of the United Kingdom will be safe in his hands.

### **PUBLIC-USE DEFIBRILLATORS**

### **TOFT AND LOUND**

If you come across someone who is not breathing or breathing erratically:

### 1. The most important thing is to call 112 or 999 immediately

When you call **112** or **999**, tell the operator that you will be using the public access defibrillator and need the **code number** to open the box.

2. Start CPR—heart compressions

3. Send someone to fetch the defibrillator

### **DO NOT delay or interrupt chest compressions** to get the defibrillator, **send** someone else to get it.

Once you have the defibrillator open it and follow the spoken instructions.

#### **VERY IMPORTANT**

### Jane's Seasonal Recipe

This is a quick and easy Dairy Diary recipe, which I have been using for many years! Blackberries have been abundant this autumn, though frozen ones work just as well.

### Blackberry yogurt sponge pudding

150ml natural yogurt 175g caster sugar 120g melted butter 2 eggs 175g plain flour 1 ½ teaspoons baking powder 150g blackberries

Mix yogurt, sugar, melted butter and eggs. Fold in flour and baking powder. Gently stir in blackberries. Pour into 18cm greased round cake tin. Bake at 180°C for 50 mins, until risen and just firm. Dust with icing sugar and serve with custard.
