## **The Vicar Writes**

#### How curious are you?

It's a well-established fact that you should never talk about politics or religion down the pub. I've always thought this was a shame as I hold degrees in both, and I quite like talking. Although I can understand why anyone would be naturally weary about broaching either subject, the truth is that I've had some of the best conversations about faith and politics over a pint or two with people who have spotted the dog collar and want to tell me what they think or to ask me some honest and searching questions. What goes on in Church rarely affords us the opportunity to ask those kinds of questions or to say what you really think. By its very nature, an invitation to come to Church is an invitation to come and join in and to do-as-we-do rather than to tell us what you think (or for you to ask us what we believe).

What seems to be missing then is an opportunity for some dialogue. So,

with that in mind we've decided to try running the Alpha Course in Edenham and Witham on the Hill. Alpha is an invitation to consider the big questions of life. It isn't a trick to get people into Church nor is it a service (secret or otherwise). It normally consists of a short video clip to watch and then some follow-up questions. There's



usually food involved (either before or after) and the whole thing should last no more than an hour and a half. Once we hit the 90-minute mark everyone is free to go! There are no (hidden) prayers, and we try to avoid overly religious language. Everyone is free to speak their mind and say what they think / feel / believe or don't.

That's the 'what' sorted, how about the 'where' and 'when'?

In the Parish Hall. Witham on the Hill, we're going to be holding the first 7 sessions on Thursdays at 10.30am starting on the 23<sup>rd</sup> of February and running through to the 30<sup>th</sup> of March. We'll finish by noon and there'll be an optional lunch with soup, bread, cheese and fruit to follow. We'll then resume after Easter to finish the final 3 sessions.

At Edenham we'll be meeting in the evening at the Regional House (Vicarage) at 7pm on Wednesdays from the 1<sup>st</sup> to the 29<sup>th</sup> of March, picking up again after Easter. In the evenings we'll begin with food and then have the session to follow (log-fires and good coffee will also feature).

The Alpha sessions are open to absolutely anyone. You can drop in whenever (and wherever) you like at either venue. We'd like to encourage as many people as possible to come along - including members of our congregations! It's a great opportunity to meet, talk, socialize, and share in a way that is rarely open to us as part of regular Church life (and you should never invite people along to something that you haven't experienced yourself).

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## Notes for the Swinstead Parish Council Meeting 12th January 2023

**Public Forum**: Two residents attended the Public Forum. The Chair opened the forum by congratulating Cllr Lynch on being named in the King's New Year's Honours list. Cllr Lynch will receive the British Empire Medal from the King later in the year. Two residents raised concerns about the proposed development behind Macham Close, in particular the building materials for the roof and general appearance of the development. District Cllr Robins advised he will support the residents' concerns and discuss the case with SKDC Planning.

Matters Arising from the Previous Meeting: The Clerk advised the problems re the re-siting of the speed sign in Creeton Road, namely the need for an individual who holds a New Road and Street works certificate in both supervisor and operative capacity. The Clerk will continue to investigate and update the Councillors. Once an appropriate person is located the licence application can proceed. The Clerk also confirmed he has been in contact with a fencing company who will provide a quote for deer fencing in the Jubilee Orchard. Cllr Lynch made the Councillors aware of another fencing company, Cllr Underhill will contact them to request another quote. Cllr Robins advised grant funding may be available under the SKDC Community Funding Scheme toward the cost of the fencing, the Clerk will pursue this. Cllr Underhill asked if there had been any response from the Clerk's attempt to contact the owner or Estate Agents of Whitegates, regards the damaged gable end to the property. The Clerk confirmed no contact. Cllr Robins advised SKDC may be able to intervene, he will make enquiries. Cllr Underhill asked the Councillors, "In an effort to reach a wider audience, could the Minutes once again be published in The Link, The Three Towers and the Community Facebook page". After discussion the Councillors agreed to the request. The Clerk to action this issue.

#### LCC Cllr Vernon report:

**Cost Of Living** – There is help available for residents struggling with the cost of living from the council and other organisations. LCC has a large section on its website with useful links including how to apply for free school meals, financial support for carers, help with childcare costs, the household support fund and the HAF (Holidays Activities and Food Programme). There is also information about the emotional support available through local organisations and SKDC has more information too. Residents facing financial difficulties can also visit <u>https://helpforhouseholds.campaign.gov.uk/</u> for details of the other support available.

**Budget Preparation** – The council again faces challenges in setting a balanced budget while maintaining the services residents rely on. Initial budget proposals for 2023/24 include: £275m for adult care and community wellbeing; £84m for children's social care; £47m for Highways; £22m for Lincolnshire Fire and Rescue

The council continues to improve efficiency using modern technology and a reduction in bureaucracy and expects to save £11.5m in 2023/24 as a result. In addition, it expects to save a further £11.8m between 2024/25 and 2026/27. The proposals include three options for a rise in council tax of between 3% to 5%. Despite this, and additional government funding, the council will still need to use between £3.4m to £10.3m from its reserves to balance the budget, based on current projections. Final proposals will be agreed by the council's executive at their meeting on Tuesday 7 February before the 2023/24 budget is set by all of the county councillors at our next full county council meeting on Friday 17 February.

#### SKDC Cllr Robins Report:

Cllr Robins confirmed that SKDC's plans to invest £3.9m from the UK Shared Prosperity Fund have received full backing from the Government, as part of its Levelling Up commitment. Confirmation of our spending plan for the £3.898m means we can now build on projects to meet our priorities of communities and place; supporting local business, people and skills. Investment will include mobile CCTV, physical improvements to our high streets, investment in arts and heritage initiatives, marketing for South Kesteven, and help for the Council to access further funding. This funding reaches all corners of the district including the numerous rural communities in South Kesteven. The Council has also been allocated a further £540,460 from the DEFRA for the delivery of the Rural England Prosperity Fund.

SKDC has moved into its new headquarters. This will improve business efficiency and working conditions, as well as saving taxpayers an estimated £300,000 a year in running costs. The new postal address is South Kesteven District Council, Council Offices, The Picture House, St Catherine's Road, Grantham, NG316TT; the main switchboard number remains 01476 406080.

SKDC Customer Service Team is temporarily based in Grantham Guildhall Arts Centre. The entrance is on Edith Smith Way between the Arts Centre and Grantham Museum and the office is open to the public Monday to Friday from 9am-1pm.

#### Important safety advice

As a responsible landlord, one of SKDC's roles is to inform tenants how they can reduce condensation and the potential for mould in their homes. This information can be found at the SKDC website, <u>www.southkesteven.gov.uk</u> by searching 'Condensation, Mould and Damp Control'.

**New online platform for public meetings**: The Council has a new video streaming service. It allows anyone to watch meetings "live" as they happen, as well as access recordings or meetings. Users can navigate to an item of interest within the meeting's agenda as well as subscribe to be notified by email about upcoming meetings. The first meeting to benefit from the new software is the Budget Joint Overview and Scrutiny Committee on Monday 9th January at 2pm via <u>https://southkesteven.public-i.tv/core/portal/home</u>. **Funding for community projects**: A new round of council community grants totalling more than £13,000 has been approved from SKDC's Community Fund. Any constituted group and organisation within South Kesteven, including parish councils, can apply for SK Community Fund grants for projects or events that benefit the local community. Applications are invited for community projects or community events. Application forms can be requested by email to <u>communityfund@southkesteven.gov.uk</u>. This time around, the Deepings will get new life-saving defibrillators to replace outdated equipment thanks to a £4,896 grant to the Lincolnshire Integrated Volunteer Emergency Service, LIVES. The iconic apple sculpture in Wyndham Park in Grantham can now be replaced thanks to a £3,200 award to the Wyndham Park Forum. And an award of £5,000 will help deliver new projects at Grantham's Jubilee Church Life Centre and extend activities within its Community Hub.

Acceptance and approval of minutes: Minutes from 8<sup>th</sup> November 2022 meeting were accepted as a true record, the Chairman signed the minutes.

Thanks also go to the Steam Action members for leading the carol singing and for providing the carol sheets. Whilst it was a very cold evening this did not impact our singing abilities and we hope everyone enjoyed the evening.

**General Drainage Main Street Edenham:** The flooding and drainage issues reported during the Parish Council meeting in November remain the same. During recent heavy rains (Christmas and New Year) both sides of the road

between Ford Cottage and the traffic lights were flooded making the footpaths hazardous.

## **Baptist Noel**

It is said that the only places to see English medieval sculpture is in our cathedrals and parish churches. This observation is nowhere more true than at the church of St. Peter and St. Paul in Exton, Rutland, which contains nine magnificent monuments, several of which are outstanding. Probably the finest is the huge marble monument to Baptist Noel, 3<sup>rd</sup> Viscount Campden, on the east wall of the north transept.

The grandly named Baptist was a nobleman in Rutland who gained notoriety in the English Civil War as a staunch Royalist who led his band of followers in brutal plundering raids across Rutland and Lincolnshire from bases in Belvoir and Newark castles.

In 1611 Baptist was born at Exton Park into the powerful Noel family, son of Edward Noel the 2<sup>nd</sup> Viscount Campden. In 1632 Baptist married Lady Anne Fielding and then Anne Bourchier in 1638. Sadly, these ladies had short lives and their children all died young. Baptist married his third wife, the Hon. Hester Wotton, in 1639 and they had four daughters and two sons who survived.

In 1639 Baptist and his father accompanied King Charles I in the ill-fated war against the Scottish National Covenant who vehemently opposed the King's attempt to reform the Scottish Church. The King summoned Parliament to provide money to support this war. The so-called Short Parliament only ran for three weeks in April 1640 and was replaced by the Long Parliament in November that year. Baptist, as a Knight of the Shire, was elected to both but, being a Royalist, his association with the latter parliament was brief.

Parliament refused to grant funds until its grievances were resolved but the autocratic Charles refused to compromise and the Civil War between them soon broke out. Baptist was commissioned into the Royalist army and was based at Newark castle when he succeeded as 3<sup>rd</sup> Viscount Campden on the

death of his father in March 1643. At the head of his troop known as the "Campdeners", he plundered the property of his local opponents and frequently imprisoned them. He rose rapidly through the ranks being appointed brigadier of foot and brigadier of horse in July 1643. Both sides fiercely contested Rutland; and Exton Park along with neighbouring Burley Park, the home of the Duke of Buckingham, were confiscated by the Parliamentarian forces.

The Campdeners seized Stamford, drove away cattle, and generally became a serious threat. It got so bad that on the 10<sup>th</sup> April 1643 Oliver Cromwell wrote to Sir John Burgoyne of Potton in Bedfordshire, the chief member of the Bedfordshire Committee, to request troops of horse to resist the raiders. On 19<sup>th</sup> July 1643 the Campdeners attacked Peterborough with a large force but were repulsed and fell back on Stamford. They were defeated at Burghley House by Cromwell on 24<sup>th</sup> July. Baptist continued to resist the Parliamentary forces, leading his cavalry troop in daring raids across Rutland and beyond.

In late 1645 the war was effectively over and Baptist resigned his field command. By October 1645 he was a prisoner in London. He was released in August 1646 and allowed to return to Rutland. He was fined over £19,000 by Parliament, this massive amount demonstrating the severity of his offences. In May 1648, after long negotiation and with Baptist severely in debt, his fine was discharged on payment of £100.

His wife, Hester, died the following year and was buried at Exton on 17<sup>th</sup> December 1649. Baptist married his fourth wife, Lady Elizabeth Bertie, eldest daughter of Montague Bertie, second earl of Lindsey, on 7<sup>th</sup> July 1655. They had nine children. After the civil war he was restored to his estates when he laid out geometric areas of woodland, divided by avenues with formal gardens, and a lake close to Exton Park. Baptist died at Exton on 29<sup>th</sup> October 1682 aged 71 years and was buried on the north side of the church there. His



wife Elizabeth survived him by only a few months, dying in July 1683.

His monument, squeezed into a space too small to adequately display it, is of white and black marble made by Grinling Gibbons, perhaps better known for his carvings in wood, celebrated as the finest sculptor working in England at the time. It shows Baptist and his fourth wife Elizabeth, flanked by two obelisks, separated by a pedestal. They are standing on a base with reliefs of their children. The whole monument is on a lower base with a relief showing his third wife Hester and hers, and on the obelisks the first and second wives,

two Annes, and their children. Twenty-five figures in all. On the base are two black marble inscriptions, on the left giving brief biographical information on Baptist, while that on the right gives the names of his children by his four wives. On the pedestal between Baptist and Elizabeth is a black marble inscription plate recording that the monument was erected by order of Elizabeth and carried out by her third son, John Noel, in 1686. The monument is topped by a large broken pediment displaying the Campden coat of arms. As was the fashion for the age, all of the figures are depicted in Roman dress. It cost £1,000, the equivalent of over £200,000 today. The monuments in Exton church were restored by the Exton Monuments Restoration Fund between 2000 and 2002. Baptist's monument cost £49,000 to restore. Opposite Baptist's monument is another to his son James Noel, who died aged 18 years. It's smaller but no less well executed. In addition, there are superb replicas of the original funerary and armorial banners of the Noel family hanging above the nave.

The church is at the end of a lane just before the village. The lane is narrow so care must be taken in case another car decides to come the other way. Parking is on the verge at the end of the lane. A visit to see the church and the monuments will be a joy. It's like an art gallery, but free, and well worth a pound or two in the collection box.

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## **STEAM ACTION**

At the beginning of December Steam Action brought their pantomime back after a three-year break. On Saturday 2<sup>nd</sup> December we held our annual Christmas party for the over 60s in the parish. ## Jane's Seasonal Recipe

A Mary Berry recipe. Delicious little nibbles to serve with drinks. The Rice Krispies give them a delicious crunch. Very moreish!

## **Crackle Cheese Biscuits**

100g soft butter 100g plain flour 100g mature cheddar cheese ¼ teaspoon salt 25g Rice Krispies

Whizz all the ingredients, except the Rice Krispies, in a food processor, until the mixture comes together. Add Rice Krispies, mix well with hands to combine. Shape into 30 small balls. Place on baking sheets lined with non-stick baking paper, bake at 180°C for 16-18 mins until lightly golden. Transfer to a wire rack to cook. Store in an airtight tin for up to a week – if they last that long!
