

The Siege of Burghley House

Few will disagree that Burghley House in Stamford is the finest Elizabethan country house in England and richly deserves its fame and its grade 1 listing. Most of the rooms and interiors received make-overs in the 18th century but the exterior largely retains its original period appearance. The magnificent 1,300-acre park surrounding the house was laid out between 1755 and 1780 by the celebrated landscape architect Capability Brown who also built the lake and the Lion Bridge. The house was built between 1555 and 1587 for Sir William Cecil, later 1st Baron Burghley, Lord High Treasurer and Secretary of State to Queen Elizabeth I. Queen Elizabeth was succeeded by King James I (also King James VI of Scotland – son of Mary Queen of Scots) in 1603, followed in turn by his son Charles I in 1625.

Charles was a very different monarch to Elizabeth. In religion he was uncompromising, enforcing the High Church form of ritual worship. He believed in the "the Divine Right of Kings", meaning he was above the law and answerable only to God. Rather than cooperate with his Parliaments Charles treated them with contempt and levied taxes without their consent. In early 1642, he tried, unsuccessfully, to arrest five members for treason. This action, and his unyielding attitude to religion and politics enraged Parliament and his subjects who saw his actions as those of an absolute and tyrannical monarch, which soon led to riots breaking out and eventually to civil war.

In its early years the war was a series of skirmishes and battles fought locally between local forces. In 1643 the Royalists, who supported the King, were in a strong position in the East Midlands having occupied Newark Castle in December 1642 and Belvoir Castle in January 1643 and large-scale raids were launched into the area from these strongholds.

On the 11th April 1643 a raid on Grantham led to a Royalist victory at

Ancaster Heath, prompting a southern offensive led by Viscount Baptist Camden. On 19th July, Camden took command of a 1,000 strong force from Belvoir and Newark Castles and assaulted Peterborough, held by the Parliamentarians. The attack was repulsed by Colonel Palgrave commanding a regiment of foot (infantry) from the Wisbech garrison. The Royalists retreated in disarray to Stamford. Palgrave was reinforced by Colonel Oliver Cromwell who arrived from Northamptonshire with seven troops of horse (cavalry) and three companies of foot.

After a vicious skirmish around Wothorpe House, the Royalists retired to the grounds of Burghley House, held by the Countess of Exeter for the King, and sheltered behind its stone walls. Cromwell suffered no losses in the skirmish but several Royalists were killed or captured.

On the 23rd July the Parliamentarians were further reinforced by 4,000 men and 14 cannon from East Anglia. In the pitch dark early the following morning they opened a two-hour bombardment but made no impression on the defenders. The Royalists were offered quarter but they refused. The fighting then resumed until the afternoon when the heavily outnumbered Royalists finally surrendered. Cromwell took them all prisoner: two Colonels, six Captains, four hundred foot, two hundred horse and all their weapons. Cromwell later sent the Countess of Exeter a portrait of himself by Robert Walker, which still hangs in Burghley House, out of the high regard he felt for the lady.

Marching towards Grantham, the Parliamentarians were attacked by four hundred "clubmen" two miles outside Stamford at Great Casterton. Clubmen were local civilians who supported neither side but who just wanted to defend their property and their families from attacks by rapacious armies. The clubmen killed some of the Parliamentarian scouts but then Cromwell sent four troops of horse to drive them off. Fifty clubmen were killed and the rest fled into nearby woods.

No siege damage to Burghley House can be seen. The south front may have been destroyed in the bombardment and, as has been suggested by some architectural historians, was rebuilt in its entirety in the late seventeenth century.

Further rebuilding took place during the period of the 9th Earl of Exeter's ownership in the eighteenth century when, guided by Capability Brown, the south front was raised to alter the roof line and to allow better views of the new parkland he had designed.

The south front is a bit difficult to get at (see opposite). The west side of the house is protected by what is known as a ha-ha (pictured below), comprising a 6-foot-deep trench, revetted on the house side with a stone wall. The ha-ha keeps the



wandering deer away from the house and garden but unlike a hedge or fence does not interrupt the view. The south end of the ha-ha is hard against a



fence and the lake. The south face of the house is also protected by the same fence and lake.
Sadly, all this protection prevents close examination and photography of the south side of the house.

The siege is a fascinating part of the history of Burghley House but strangely the attack is not mentioned anywhere, neither at Burghley itself nor in its website nor in any of its publicity. Nevertheless, a visit is always rewarding. Although a charge is made for a tour of the house, entrance to the grounds is free. A new car park opened in May 2023 and is also free, at least for the moment. The grounds are wonderful to walk around with many ancient trees particularly oaks, sweet chestnuts and sequoias dotted about, and some stately tall conifers at the west end of the lake. The herds of deer appear to wander at will and are very photogenic, providing they are not approached too closely. It's all very calm and very peaceful, a far cry from the sounds of cannon fire and conflict from times long ago.

The Vicar Writes

"Liberate yourself from the Original Mumbo-Jumbo that liberated you from the Original Sin you never had!"

Such was the header being used by the National Secular Society (NSS) on its website a few years back selling 'official' De-Baptism certificates. For while the NSS had been asking the Church of England to provide a formal procedure for the cancelling of baptisms (including the removal of names from Baptismal Registers). In the face of obvious resistance, the NSS came up with a document of its own.

The "Certificate of De-Baptism" was designed to have a deliberately 'home-made look complete with mock-official decoration and quasi-official language'. It read:

I ______ having been subjected to the Rite of Christian Baptism in infancy (before reaching an age of consent), hereby publicly revoke any implications of that Rite and renounce the Church that carried it out. In the name of human reason, I

reject all its Creeds and all other such superstition in particular, the perfidious belief that any baby needs to be cleansed by Baptism of alleged ORIGINAL SIN, and the evil power of supposed demons. I wish to be excluded henceforth from enhanced claims of church membership numbers based on past baptismal statistics used, for example, for the purpose of securing legislative privilege.

The then NSS president, Terry Sanderson, said the certificates weren't designed to be taken too seriously. Despite this, the NSS claimed that more than 60,000 copies had been downloaded. Given that each certificate cost £3, basic mathematics suggests that the initiative provided the NSS with revenue of more than £180,000. Not bad for something that 'should not be taken too seriously' (especially when you consider that Baptisms are free).

When Pope Benedict visited Britain in September 2010, he spoke of what he identified as being the secularisation of Europe and the

wider western world and how, increasingly, indifference to Christianity has given way to both hostility and derision. In his first letter, St John reminds us of the contrast between the Spirit of God and the spirit of the world, which he calls "the spirit of falsehood" (1 John 4). The reality today is that we live in a world that's becoming increasingly disinterested in what the Church has to say.

When people stop listening, what do you do? Give up and retreat into your own private world or club? Well, no. When Jesus embarked on his public ministry he not only spoke to people but he also actively went about doing good and making a difference in the lives of others. He met people where they were, both physically and spiritually. They saw and heard him, and this brought them hope and certainty in a way that nothing else could.

If we find it hard to put our faith into words (or when those words seem to have little or no impact), then we need to try find ways in which our actions can (and will) speak for us.

We need to ask how we can manifest our faith in a way that will not only get the message across but also bring with it a real and positive outcome for our hearers. In some sense it takes us back to the basic principle of 'actions speaking louder than words'.

If you think that this sounds a little too secular (or even that it sounds a lot like cheating) then don't forget that the very same dynamic and intention led to the birth of Christ himself. The whole point of the Incarnation (God becoming man) was to show and demonstrate God's loving intention to all mankind together with his plan for conquering Original Sin once and for all, free of charge.

Jesus paid the price for us so that we don't have to pay it ourselves. He's not asking for £3 in return; all he's asking is that we entertain the possibility that there's something more to all of this than simply what we can see and know by ourselves. It's an invitation that's never struck me as being a particularly hard sell (nor has it ever sounded to me like a load of mumbo-jumbo). Freedom

Swinstead Parish Council Clerk's Notes—13 July 2023

Draft Minutes of the Parish Council meeting held on Thursday 11th May 2023 were agreed and accepted unanimously.

Matters Arising. Highways has approved the installation of two dropped kerbs in Park Road at no cost to the Parish Council, thus enabling safe crossing for those with mobility issues. The Clerk confirmed that he had spoken with the Airfields of Britain Conservation Trust, in relation to the Consecration of the WW1 Plaque in Creeton Road. The Trust advised that a number of villages have held a Consecration service. Fr Edward has kindly offered his services for the service. Cllr Hoodless will liaise with Fr Edward to confirm a date for the service, all those interested will be welcome to attend.

Cheques to be signed. Clerk's salary expenses £514.07, Village Hall hire £48. Both were agreed and signed.

New Bank Mandate. New signatories are required. The appropriate forms were passed to Cllrs Whitworth and Robinson for completion.

Neighbourhood Plan. The Parish Council is keen to investigate the possibility of creating a Neighbourhood Plan for the village. Cllr Vernon provided valuable information on the subject, time scale and the availability of grants to cover costs. Cllr Vernon suggested speaking with Cllr Nick Robins to confirm details of parish councils that have completed the process.

Highways. New Estate Flooding. The Clerk confirmed he had spoken to Highways regarding the ongoing problem of flooding at New Estate. Despite the Clerk suggesting the possibility of a collapse in the drain, Highways advised it will clean the drain on the next cycle.

1. Fraxinous excelsion. (Ash tree) T1, fell to ground. (SKDC Work Allowed 14th June 2023)

S23/0691, Mr & Mrs Michael Sylvester, 28 High Street Swinstead, alterations to rear extension to include the removal and replacement of two windows, remove flat ceiling and replace with sloping ceiling, remove internal walls and doors, change bathroom suite and utility units. (SKDC consent has been granted)

Jubilee Orchard. Cllr Whitworth proposed installing a rabbit fence at the base of the deer fencing to prevent rabbits and muntjacs getting into the orchard, this was seconded by Cllr Robinson. After discussion, the councillors agreed unanimously. The councillors also discussed the future use of the orchard with the possibility of an "Orchard Fest" in September to celebrate the fruit harvest. The Clerk to speak with the Grimsthorpe Estate for clarification. Residents, watch this space.

Additional Litter Bins. Cllr Robinson asked if additional litter bins could be purchased from SKDC as the village only has one, currently located at the bus stop. He suggested they be positioned at the three entrances to the village. The Clerk to investigate.

AOB. Cllr Whitworth confirmed she is trying to confirm a date with the engineers who will service the defibrillator. The Clerk advised he is waiting to receive a quote to replace the signage on the planter in Creeton Road as it has degraded significantly. To be added to the September agenda for discussion.

WITHAM ON THE HILL WI

Our July meeting was a joint one with Carlby WI at Carlby village hall. The speaker, Jim Irvine, spoke of his Discovery of the Rutland Roman Villa. Jim explained that he is the son of the farmer who owns the 9-acre field near Ketton, where the villa was found. Early in 2020, severe flooding resulted in areas of the field being bare of crop. During lockdown in 2020, he met his family in the field. Walking along the river he noticed lots of bits and pieces, pottery and oyster shells that he hadn't seen before. He did some research, looked at aerial maps and LIDAR images from June 2018 during a very dry spell. He noticed crop marks. One Saturday in August 2020, after the wheat had been cut, he set out to locate the wall in the field. He dug a trench 2 feet down and found not a wall but one-inch square mosaic tiles! He expanded the trench and found more tiles, revealing a foot, then a person! At the end of the day he decided to call in an expert, Helen Wells, Leicestershire Historical Environment Records Officer. Alice Roberts, "Digging for Britain", came to look and did a TV programme. Archaeologists from Leicester University did the excavations. Various methods were used. Eventually the whole site was exposed – 11 metres long and 7 metres wide, showing 3 picture panels, depicting the story of Hector and Achilles fighting with spears. Coins dated 370AD, engineer's callipers, skeletons and pillar remnants have also been found. To preserve the mosaic, it has been covered in sand then with a protective membrane and is now a grass field!

What a fascinating talk! Carlby WI was thanked for hosting an excellent evening. Various outings are on offer for the coming months: a guided tour of Stamford on 4 September and a felting workshop on 23 September.

The next meeting will be on Tuesday 1 August at 7.30pm in the St Andrew's Parish Hall in Witham, when Jean Jeffries will give us some recycling ideas. New members and visitors are always most welcome. For further information, contact Jane Clark tel 01778 590232.

Jane's Seasonal Recipe

Who doesn't like strawberry ice cream? This is quick and easy to make and tastes heavenly!

Strawberry and clotted cream ice cream

600g strawberries
2 tablespoons golden caster sugar
275g clotted cream
400g tin condensed milk
300ml whipping cream

Put chopped strawberries and sugar in a pan and simmer gently for 15 mins. Leave to cool for 10 mins, then whizz in a blender until smooth. In a large bowl beat the clotted cream until smooth. Gradually whisk in condensed milk until smooth and well mixed. Add the whipping cream and whisk until soft peaks form. Fold in the strawberry puree. Freeze in a container for at least 6 hours.
